Este curso realiza una revisión general sobre la historia del capitalismo en los últimos cinco siglos. Se examinará la transición de las economías agrícolas a las industriales, comenzando en Gran Bretaña y Europa occidental y luego pasando a Estados Unidos, América Latina, Europa del Este y Asia, y las implicaciones de este cambio para los trabajadores, los estados-nación y el bienestar humano en general. Se explorarán el papel de la tecnología, el trabajo, el capital humano, los recursos naturales, las políticas y las instituciones, la esclavitud, los patrones de consumo, la cultura y el imperialismo. Examinaremos las implicaciones de esta era de cambios económicos y sociales dramáticos en la forma en que las personas viven y trabajan, en su bienestar material, y en sus patrones de consumo. En otras palabras, el curso brinda una ventana a la historia del capitalismo y las características del mundo en el que vivimos hoy.

REQUISITOS DEL CURSO

- 1) Participación. Este curso combina cátedra, debate y tareas. Se espera que los estudiantes vengan a cada clase preparados para contribuir a las discusiones: hablar sobre las lecturas y los materiales de manera informada, haciendo preguntas o compartiendo lo que encontraron interesante, confuso, persuasivo o revelador: 20 % de la calificación final.
- 2) Ensayos. Habrá dos asignaciones de ensayos breves durante el semestre que implican localizar y sintetizar trabajos académicos sobre un tema seleccionado y producir un ensayo de 4-5 páginas. Se distribuirán más instrucciones en clase; las fechas de vencimiento están en el programa semanal: 30 % de la calificación final.
- 3) Exámenes: parciales y finales. Habrá un examen parcial y un examen final. 50% de la nota final.

LECTURAS OBLIGATORIAS

Las lecturas requeridas para cada semana y sesión de clase se enumeran en el programa a continuación. La mayoría son capítulos de libros o artículos de revistas académicas que estarán disponibles electrónicamente. Las asignaciones de lectura semanales normalmente tendrán menos de 100 páginas.
